Visual Example Imagine a square with sides labeled 4 cm Draw it Write an Equation Translate the problem into a mathematical equation For example John has 5 apples and Mary has 3 more than John How many apples does Mary have translates to $5 + 3 = x$ Work Backwards In some cases working backwards from the answer can help you determine the solution Break It Down For multistep problems break the problem into smaller more manageable parts 4 Show Your Work Dont just write down the answer Show your calculations and reasoning This helps identify mistakes and provides a clear record of your thought process 5 Check Your Answer After solving a problem review your work and check if your answer makes sense in the context of the problem Does it seem reasonable 6 Review Mistakes Dont just skip over incorrect answers Analyze where you went wrong and try to understand the concept again

Visual Aids and Problem Examples Lets consider a few examples

Example 1 Fractions Sarah baked a cake and cut it into 12 slices She ate $\frac{1}{3}$ of the cake How many slices did she eat 3 Visual Imagine a circle the cake divided into 12 slices Shade $\frac{1}{3}$ of the circle This visually shows that Sarah ate 4 slices $12 \times \frac{1}{3} = 4$ slices

Example 2 Decimals A shirt costs \$15.99 and a pair of pants costs \$24.50 What is the total cost Solution $15.99 + 24.50 = 40.49$

Example 3 MultiStep Problem A train travels 60 miles per hour How far will it travel in 25 hours Solution $60 \text{ miles/hour} \times 25 \text{ hours} = 1500 \text{ miles}$
